

Police Chief Arnold Retires



David Arnold retired on Friday, August 12, 2022. Prior to coming to Lower Windsor Township Police in January of 2019, he was the Chief of Police with Chambersburg Borough Police Department from 2008 to 2016. He is also a twenty-four year veteran of the York City Police Department, retir-

ing as rank of Captain. Overall, he has spent thirty-five plus years in law enforcement.

During his tenure with the Lower Windsor Township Police Department, many advances in technology and organization have occurred. Chief Arnold initiated a number of programs that have advanced the Department with community relations, Department organization and development, as well as officer growth and advancement, just to name a few.

Notable Accomplishments

In August of 2019, Chief David Arnold assisted the Township and Eastern York School District in creating a School Resource Officer (SRO). This has shown to be an asset to both the school district and police department, as well as the community. This developed relationship is set to continue for many years thanks in part to the efforts of Chief David Arnold and the Eastern York School District. In July of 2020, Chief Arnold also had the Department's Use of Force Policy reviewed by legal counsel to make sure it complied with today's best practices. In April of 2021, Chief Arnold also deployed the departments WatchGuard Cameras which were purchased partially through a Federal Grant administered by the PA Chiefs of Police. This technology is keeping our department accountable to the public.

Chief Arnold implemented using CrimeWatch for Lower Windsor Township, a website that many York County police departments utilize to send out news releases and provide general information to the public. He encouraged continued education for officers and grants for safe driving. Chief Arnold brought to Lower Windsor Township programs such as National Night Out and Coffee with a Cop, which have shown to be a positive impact on police and community relations.

Chief Arnold's absence will be felt by the Township, police department and the community. We wish him well in all his future endeavors. Happy Well Deserved Retirement Chief!

Supervisors Promote L. James Thomas to Chief of Police



On the evening of August 11, 2022, at the Board of Supervisors meeting, L. James "Jim" Thomas was promoted from the rank of Sergeant to Chief of Police.

Chief Thomas' career began in 1995 where he was employed by Quarryville Borough Police Department in Lancaster County. While at Quarryville, Chief Thomas held the rank of Patrolman First Class. He was an Assistant EMA Director, and was recognized as one of Lancaster County's Officers of The Year.

Chief Thomas began working for Lower Windsor Township in 1998, advancing to Corporal in 2004. He was then promoted to Sergeant in 2018. For sixteen years Chief Thomas was one of two-hundred fifty motor carrier inspectors for the State Police. Along with his position of patrol sergeant he was the evidence custodian, organized the departmental breath and speed time devices, and researched the PA Bulletin for updates to state laws.

Training and Leadership

Chief Thomas' training background includes: Megan's Law, hate crimes, advanced DUI training, traffic enforcement, and MCSAP truck inspector.

His leadership positions include: York County Police Pipe and Drums, where he helped to initiate and continues to lead the organization; Leads the annual EPB Memorial Day Parade; Chairman of the Board of Directors, for the York Police Heritage Museum, and organizes the York Fallen Officers Memorial at the Department of Emergency Center. The Department has changed over the years. In 2004 the Township built its municipal complex at 2425 Craley Road, which houses the police department. The Department has grown to its current staff of nine fulltime officers and one civilian administrative assistant.

Comprehensive Plan Update

The Lower Windsor Township Planning Commission and staff have been hard at work along with our consultant from C S Davidson on the Comprehensive Plan update. It's been a long time coming, and we continue working on it at most Planning Commission Meetings.

You may remember from our Spring Newsletter, the Township published a community survey to assist the Planning Commission in gathering public input surrounding topics and issues related to: land use, development, community services, housing, transportation, and the environment.

The survey was available in both electronic and paper formats and copies of the survey were available for pick up at locations throughout the Township. The survey was available between April and June of this year. The Township received 275 responses, which equates to a 3.7% response rate.



In regards to growth and development in the Township, respondents overwhelmingly encouraged conservation of: open space (80%), prime agricultural land (81%), natural resources (85%), and scenic views (82%). He has training in DUI, Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE), and other DUI tactics. With his advanced knowledge of boating and fish laws, Officer Lake will bring increased enforcement and traffic control to the waterfront recreation district.

Zoning Department

In an emergency, would emergency personnel be able to find your home?

In 2008 the Board of Supervisors passed an Ordinance requiring all buildings that have an address to post and maintain the street number on the building. These numbers must be no less than four inches high, of contrasting color, and located so that they can be seen from the road (reflective is best, but not required).

On buildings more than one hundred feet from the road or where landscaping conceals them, the numbers must be posted at the end of the driveway nearest the road. Where more than one building is located along a private road or access drive, each address must be posted at the entrance from the street <u>and</u> at each individual drive or front yard.

Numbers on a mailbox or mailbox post are satisfactory to meet this Ordinance ONLY if the mailbox is directly in front of the building, and no other mailbox is grouped with it.

It is important to have your house number visible from the street for your family's health, safety, and welfare. Ambulance, fire and police services have noticed an issue with houses that do not display street numbers. It's also a Township requirement!

Hiring a Contractor

Once you hire a contractor, but three weeks BEFORE work is scheduled to begin, the homeowner or the contractor MUST apply for a permit. Building permits can take up to fifteen business days, because they are reviewed by a third party, Commonwealth Code Inspection Services, Inc.

If the contractor applies for the permit, the homeowner should ask the contractor for the permit, so that it may be posted in the window of the residence. If the contractor does not get a permit, the homeowner is still legally responsible to obtain one.

Swimming Pools

Any pool with the ability to hold water deeper than twenty-four inches requires a permit and inspection from Lower Windsor Township. This includes 'big box store' pool kits.


Consider the following building permit guidelines BEFORE you make a pool purchase.

- Swimming pools must be completely enclosed by a four foot high fence or wall with a self-closing locking gate. This does not apply to above ground pools having a minimum solid wall height of four feet and having a retractable ladder, or those having less than twenty-four inches of water. The fence or wall must be erected and inspected before the pool is filled with water.
- All pools shall be set back five feet from side and rear property lines measured either from the wall of the pool or any associated decking or concrete aprons.
- No water from a pool shall be discharged onto any public street or alley nor onto adjoining property.
- Pools MAY NOT use extension cords to connect the pump. A single twistlock receptacle may be located between five and ten feet from the pool. A 120 volt convenience outlet shall be located within ten feet and twenty feet of the pool. All receptacles serving the pool and all outdoor receptacles shall be GFCI protected.

These regulations apply to all pools with water that is or can be twentyfour inches or deeper.

Sight Triangle

What is a Clear Sight Triangle? A clear sight triangle is defined as a triangular shaped portion of land (see image).



Established at the intersection of any streets in which nothing is erected, placed, planted

or allowed to grow, so that it limits or obstructs the view of motorists entering or leaving the intersection.

The Lower Windsor Township Zoning Department would like to remind residents that bushes and trees need to be kept trimmed at clear sight triangles, so as not to cause a visibility problem for traffic.

OLDS (On-Lot Disposal System)

Residents in septic pumping District #1 were notified via a postcard mailing in January that 2022 is the year to have their septic systems pumped and inspected by December 31, 2022. If you did not receive a postcard and think you should have, please contact the Township office at 717-244-6813, to verify your pumping district.

District # 1 consists of all properties east of Cool Creek Road and Cabin Creek Road and north of East Prospect Road and Calvary Church Road.

Noncompliance WILL result in penalties!

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Winter Electrical Safety Tips

With a little preparation and a few precautions, you can keep you, your family, and your home safe and warm this winter.

Winter Electrical Safety Tips

Space Heaters - According to the Electrical Safety Foundation International (ESFI), heating equipment, like portable space heaters, are the second leading cause of home fires in the United States and more than 65,000 home fires are attributed to heating equipment annually. It's important to use these devices sparingly, and only when needed, to prevent something from going wrong.

• Before using a space heater, read the manufacturer's instructions in full.

• Don't plug space heaters into extension cords or power strips.

• Be sure to give space heaters plenty of room and keep them on a level surface away from flammable objects and foot traffic. • Remember to only use a space heater when needed, and don't leave a heater unattended while in use. Make sure you turn it off and unplug the cord when you're not using the device.

Generators - If the power goes out during a winter storm, you may turn to a generator. Generators can pose a serious risk to your health. In fact, the Consumer Product Safety Commission reports that fifty percent (50%) of all generator related carbon monoxide deaths occur during the winter months.

• Be sure you are reading, and following, the manufacturer's guidelines for operation and take heed of any warnings. This includes making sure you use the proper fuel for the generator, and only add fuel when the generator is cool.

• Before each use, inspect the generator to ensure it's in good working order.

• Generators should never be used in an enclosed area

or placed inside a home or business. Be sure to also keep them away from windows and vents that could allow carbon monoxide to sneak inside.

• Even though you will be using the generator outside, make sure that your home has battery operated carbon monoxide detectors that are in good, working condition.

• Make sure you never back feed power from the generator into your home. Doing so can create serious safety hazards for linemen working to restore your service by sending power back outside of your home.

Electric Blankets and Heating Pads - Both electric blankets and heating pads can provide some relief from the cold. While they may seem harmless, they cause almost five-hundred fires each year, according to ESFI. Here are some helpful tips to keep you safe:

• Heating pads and electric blankets are not designed to be used interchangeably or at the same time.

• Always be sure to inspect the device before using it. Start by checking the electrical cord and replace the item if you find any damage.

• Do not place other objects or blankets on top of an electric blanket while it's in use. It can easily overheat.

• Do not tuck an electric blanket into the mattress and avoid folding it. Both can cause the blanket to overheat.

• Never leave these devices unattended or use them while you are sleeping. *Source: PPL*

They will replace any batteries if needed or replace the detector if it is no longer working properly. Interested residents should email their name, address and contact information to set up an initial visit.

Green Reflective Signs - In the event of an emergency, could a first responder quickly locate your residence? The Department has available for purchase green reflective signs. The signs are rectangular, double sided, and can fit up to five numbers. **Cost:** \$15.00.




Fire Prevention Week - October 9 - 15, 2022

- Avoid parking along Township roads when snow storms are anticipated. If a road is designated a Snow Emergency Route, vehicles must be removed from the roadway when there is three or more inches of snow expected.
- When a snow emergency is declared, Lower Windsor Township utilizes the major local television stations for resident notification.

- When clearing your driveway, shovel the snow on the lower side of the driveway so that the plow doesn't push it back into the area you have already shoveled.

percent (52%) of residents would encourage the development of housing for seniors.

Seventy-five percent (75%) of respondent's felt that the level of crime in the township was "not too serious" or "not serious at all", which our Police Department was happy to hear. When asked what the greatest problems facing the Township were, the top five responses were: traffic issues, drug abuse, bullying, excessive use of fireworks, and air pollution. A big thank you goes out to all residents who took time to fill out the survey.

Residents are encouraged to attend the Planning Commission meetings to be a part of the effort. Meetings are typically the 4th Thursday of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the Municipal meeting room.

The Susquehanna National Heritage Area (SNHA) purchased the 110 year old electric boat in 2021. Acquiring the vessel was the SNHA's first step in preparation for their River Discovery Boat Tours. The Chief Uncas will be the flagship boat of this initiative.

After undergoing months of safety improvements in a warehouse, the Chief Uncas will be put through in-water testing and US Coast Guard certification on Lake Clarke before it is cleared for commercial use. The mahogany planked, six ton, fifty-five foot long boat is set to begin its tours later this summer through mid October
